ENGAGE students

- REVIEW. "This is the third of three lessons about an amazing instrument- the organ! What do you remember about the organ from the first two videos?"
- EXPLAIN. "In the first lesson, we learned there are many different kind of organs. In the second lesson, we learned how the pipe organ works. Today we will learn how several different composers used the pipe organ to create different sounds and moods."

EXPLORE sounds


- LEARN. *"Timbre* (TAM-ber) is an important music word, used to describe the special and unique quality of any sound. Remember that an organist can pull out different stops to create different timbres."
- WATCH. Watch the Class Notes video, <u>Composers and the Pipe Organ</u>. (3 min.)
- COMPARE. Use the <u>provided listening grid</u> to compare and contrast four pieces featured in the video. You might print out grids for students to complete individually or fill it out as a class. Re-watch the video if needed!
- SHARE. Share with a neighbor your favorite of the four pieces and why.
